The KSU Archives has just completed a sizeable renovation. Coming on the heels of their expansion in January, these improvements include the addition of a digital projects room, with new color printers and scanners, and doubling the size of their processing and reading rooms. "It feels like we've doubled in size," says Tamara Livingston, Director of Archives. "We're thrilled." In addition to the expansion, the archives has also added a part-time position, filled by Jeff Mathews (see Staff Developments, page 4). The Sturgis Library plays an essential role in teaching and research in every area of study at Kennesaw State University. To support the teaching and scholarly mission of the University we provide state-of-the-art electronic information and research capabilities as well as traditional books and journals. As such more than 5,000 students and users come into the library during our day and 1,453 visits occur virtually on average each day during the semester, as students and faculty access online resources through our web site.

At Kennesaw State, the most-used library materials are electronic journals and reference works. Students and faculty have voted with their keyboards, and most of our subscriptions for journals, *(continued on page 4)*


## Library Hosts *Modern Marvels* Discussion Series

## Database Spotlight: EBSCOhost 2.0

This July, EBSCOhost databases introduced a brand new interface. One of the Sturgis Library's most popular database sets, the EBSCOhost makeover isn't just a new look on an old face. This new version provides a number of useful new features, including SmartText searching - a natural language search strategy that allows you to enter as much text for their search as you want – a phrase, a sentence, paragraph, or even whole pages. The database then analyzes your text, assigns relevancy of words and runs a search based on the text. A truly nifty feature. But not everything has changed; for example, for those of you with personal accounts on EBSCO, all your alerts, saved searches and folders stuffed with articles are still there.




## Library Reaches Out



## In Brief

- ◆ The three divisions of the library -- Sturgis Library, Bentley Rare Book Room, and KSU Archives -- have just released their annual reports for 2008. PDF copies are available on the library's administration page at <http://www.kennesaw.edu/library/services/reports.htm>.
- ◆ The library's bibliographic instruction department is now offering specialty classes to its Open BI schedule. Bolstered by the success of the legal BIs, the Open BI schedule now offers classes on education, english, nursing, history, criminal law, chemistry, business, communication, the visual arts, music, and biology. Like the legal material instruction sessions, these classes will focus on the appropriate resources and databases available for their specific subject. - ◆ The library has added a new collection in conjunction with the History Department's Center for the Study of the Civil War Era. The collection focuses on "a variety of records and resources exploring the lives of both Union and Confederate citizens and soldiers during the nineteenth century in the 'Historic South'." The collection currently contains about 300 volumes, but plans to expand to about 20,000. The collection can currently be found on the third floor of the library.

journal indexes, and such reference works, as Contemporary Authors are online. That number is growing annually as online versions of printed sources takes the place of the printed works.

Books for everyday reading are somewhat of a different story. While our users prefer traditional paper books, they like the online versions for their anytime anywhere availability. If library users are also Amazon.com users, we know they go to Amazon to perform research queries in sample text and that students often use Google texts and search engine queries for the same purpose. Although readers' willingness to read "books" in digital form will continue to take some time to develop, The Sturgis Library will continue to offer digital books in our collections.
