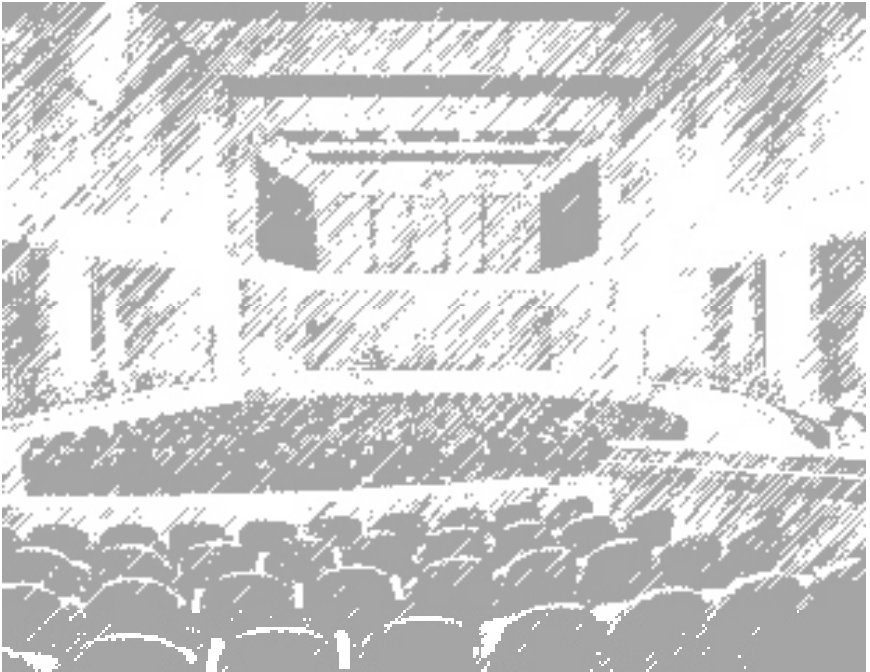

Program Notes

Symphonie Espagnole

EDOUARD LALO

1823-1892

Lalo composed the *Symphonie Espagnole* in 1874 for the violinist Pablo de Sarasate, who introduced the work in Paris on February 7, 1875. The original score calls for solo violin and an orchestra consisting of two flutes and piccolo, two oboes, two clarinets, two bassoons, four horns, two trumpets, three trombones, timpani, triangle, snare drum, harp, and strings.

Sonata No.1 in D major

LUDWIG VAN BEETHOVEN

1770-1827

Ludwig van Beethoven's *Violin Sonata No. 1 in D major* is a violin sonata from his *Opus 12* set, along with his *Violin Sonata No. 2* and *Violin Sonata No. 3*. It was written in 1798 and dedicated to Antonio Salieri. It has three movements.

Playera

PABLO DE SARASATE

1844-1908

Sarasate was a Spanish violinist and composer of the Romantic period. Sarasate, who had been playing in public since childhood, made his Paris debut as a concert violinist in 1860, and played in London the following year. Over the course of his career, he toured many parts of the world, performing in Europe, North America, and South America. His artistic pre-eminence was due principally to the purity of his tone, which was free from any tendency towards the sentimental or rhapsodic, and to that impressive facility of execution that made him a virtuoso.

Romanian Folk Dances

BELA BARTOK

1881-1945

Romanian Folk Dances is a suite of six short piano pieces composed by Béla Bartók in 1915. He later orchestrated it for small ensemble in 1917. It is based on seven Romanian tunes from Transylvania, originally played on fiddle or shepherd's flute. The original name for the piece was titled *Romanian Folk Dances from Hungary* but was later changed by Bartók when Transylvania joined Romania in 1918. It is nowadays available in the 1971 edition which is written with key signatures although Bartok rarely ever wrote key signatures.
