

# Program Notes

## **Six Studies in English Folk Song**

RALPH VAUGHAN WILLIAMS

Ralph Vaughan Williams is one of the most recognized of all English composers. He composed several well-known pieces in the choral and orchestral mediums. He often put text to words in his choral works and is one of the English composers known for travelling to collect folk music across the country from everyday people.

*Six Studies in English Folk Song* was composed in 1926 and was originally set to cello and piano but was later transcribed for various other instruments. Each movement, save the 6th, is very reflective and contains subtle musical gestures. Vaughan Williams instructed that these songs be “treated with love” with respect to the beauty in each song.

## **Conversation**

CHARLES SMALL

Charles Small has had a long career as a New York freelance trombonist. He played in the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and later in the ABC Staff Radio Orchestra. Small composed *Conversation* in 1976 for bass trombonist David Taylor and himself. This composition has become a cornerstone in the trombone duet repertoire and features ‘dialogue’ between the two players.

## **Concerto for Three Trombones**

DEREK BOURGEOIS

Derek Bourgeois is an English composer with a library of numerous works. A catalogue of his opuses currently reaches 356, including a long and wide variety of chamber music, 15 concertos, and an astounding 91 symphonies. The trombone community knows him through his works for trombone choir and his concertos for tenor trombone, bass trombone, and 3 trombones.

The *Concerto for Three Trombones* was composed in 1977 and is composed in 3 movements. The first movement explores the technical as well as tonal and blending possibilities of trombones. Bourgeois uses alteration of rhythm and consonance throughout the work. In addition he utilizes the sounds created by straight mutes and the effect of glissandos. These compositional techniques create quirky motives driven by the raw power of the trombone.

# Biography

**J**oseph Poole is a trombonist and composer of the Atlanta, Georgia area. He has served as bass trombonist of the Symphony Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, and Jazz Band at Kennesaw State University since 2011. In addition, he is a member and librarian of the Trombone Choir. Joseph has also played with the Georgia Symphony Orchestra. His primary teachers have been George Curran of the New York Philharmonic, Tom Gibson of the Atlanta Pops Symphony Orchestra, and Brian Hecht of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.

Joseph's activities include recent participation in the KSU ensembles recording of the music of Chen Yi, and playing this summer as a member of the Participant Class at the 2014 Southeast Trombone Symposium at Columbus State University.
